



Women in Farming Enterprises Ongerup 2020 President's Report

October was the final Ongerup Women in Farming Enterprises meeting for 2020 and capped off a year like no other. With 31 financial members, Ongerup WIFE has remained the largest branch within the WIFE network, servicing women from Ongerup, Jerramungup, Bremer Bay, Wellstead, Borden Gnowangerup, Pingrup, Nyabing and everywhere in between.



February the AGM was followed by a course on Microsoft Outlook and time management which was hosted by Lincolns and run in conjunction with the Ongerup CRC.

March members met for a "Back to Basics" (where members share tips and ideas centred around WIFE core areas including management of office, income, finance, risk, staff, home and families). The March meeting had a focus on OH&S and members shared their experience with different systems and procedures.

April social distancing laws prohibited face to face meetings which led to our first ever online Zoom meeting. The meeting was joined by members at home and Thelma Jaekel and Jane Looker from Sound Life Financial Services who presented a range of financial planning topics including investments, superannuation, retirement, boarding school fees and personal insurance.

May another Back to Basics reflected on seeding and lessons learned from the first year of compulsory Single Touch Payroll. Discussions revealed great interest in the different software available.

June meeting was held in conjunction with WIFE's webinar on grain marketing with Mae Connelly from Farmanco and covered market updates, price variations, selling strategies and swaps.

July meeting was postponed until August, where Ed Riggall from AgPro Management presented the Branch's inaugural livestock day. His presentation was open to any aspect of sheep that members wanted to discuss and covered topics including feeding rates, fat scores, breeding and much more. It received highly positive reviews from members and another livestock day will be considered for next year.

September Kyran Brooks from Foreman Rural returned to facilitate our second agronomy field walk. This year focussed on wheat and covered a range of areas including plant development, chemical and fertiliser use, disease, frost and soil constraints.

Additionally, in September WIFE held its first Regional Rendezvous in response to the Annual Seminar being cancelled earlier in the year due to COVID-19. The events were open to all members to attend presentations from multiple guest speakers at either Kulin or Kojonup.

The year finished with the final Back to Basics in October to discuss harvest, reflect on 2020 and plan for 2021. After discussion, topics that will be considered for next year include:

- Farm safety and the new legislation
- Insurance (understanding different types, what is and isn't covered and what to look for)
- Agronomy field walk and trial site visit (focusing on canola or barley)
- Livestock day incorporating either a stud visit or wool tour
- Processing and analysing yield data to make informed decisions
- Power BI (connecting various programs together to interact and improve efficiency e.g. linking accounting, paddock planning and GPS software)
- Business performance analysis and benchmarking
- Farm security
- Regenerative Ag (an introduction)
- Presentations on emerging business software
- First Aid



Gardening:

December In Your Patch

Life really start ramping up festive wise at this time of year, and things are certainly starting to bear fruit in your patch, its December! Hopefully you've already put in loads of produce plants but it's not too late to get some more growing, especially if you've had the pleasure of already harvesting some plants. Keep up the good work in the garden – despite the rising heat there's still plenty to do this month in your patch. And with Christmas coming, there are plenty of ways you can create gifts for family and friends. [Get some tips!](#)



And if you're heading off on a trip this break, read our tips on preventing "holiday-itis" in the garden. It's an all too common occurrence that can turn the most beautiful backyard into a garden grave in a matter of weeks! Give your garden the gift of a bit of your time this December... you'll be so pleased you did!

• It is pretty warm, so if you are heading away for a while, it's probably best to avoid planting at this stage. If you are hanging around at home, why not try some of these favourites; silverbeet, lettuce, leek, beans, corn, squash (summer), leek, eggplants, beetroot, carrots, chilli, cucumber, pumpkin and zucchini.

• For some super herbs in the temperate areas, try basil (both sweet and purple), parsley, pyrethrum and lemongrass. Mint can be planted now but you might want to keep it in a nice sized pot, just to prevent serious mint invasion!

• Why not try some lovely flowering stuff in your patch as well. Nasturtium, verbena, petunias, marigolds, phlox and celosia are great at attracting pollinators and beneficial insects to your patch. They add a touch of pretty to your patch too.

• Consider a green manure crop to add some life and love to an overworked patch. At this time of year, try cow pea, mung bean, soy bean and millet. This will improve your soil incredibly, and return some nutrients that are needed for healthy vigorous growth. With a bit of forward planning you'll find it well worth the effort!

• Plants feel the need for a feed at this time of year. A seaweed tea or low environmental impact liquid fertiliser is perfect, especially for the seedlings planted in during November. They'll be ready for a bit of a feed by now. Apply to the soil early in the morning, and in the concentrations mentioned on the packet.

• Top up mulch on your veggie patches, herb gardens and ornamental beds, especially important if you are heading off this holidays. A hot summer tip is to mulch after watering the patch; to a depth of about 7cm. Keep mulch clear of plant stems, especially young seedlings. Choose sustainable, low environmental impact mulch, one that will enrich your soil as it breaks down like pea or lucerne straw.

• On non-gardening days, why not head out to the shed, and construct a couple of shade cloth tents. They don't have to elaborate, just a simple, moveable structure that you can pop over the top of some of the sun sensitive veggies (like eggplant, capsicum and others) as the heat becomes more intense. Think of it as slip, slop, slap for plants! Pop these around where required, especially on high UV days, windy days, and during your holidays.

• Going away? Consider installing a drip irrigation system in your patch before you leave. These systems deliver water where it is needed, the roots, and when covered by mulch, are invisible garden lifesavers! Install on a tap timer and you're set! Make sure you choose one appropriate to the needs of your plants; they come with a variety of 'drips per minute.'



• Weeding is an awesome job to do at this time of year. Cut down the competition between your tasty treats and these space invaders and tidy up your patch. It may sound tedious, but it's incredibly rewarding! Weeds use nutrients that you have set aside specifically for your produce plants, don't let it leach away!

• Protect your pot plants while you are away this summer. Mulch the top of the pots, sit them in a saucer of water, or the bathtub if it gets enough light, and you'll be set! Or even run dripper lines to

them from your main irrigation pipes.

- Give the gift that keeps on giving. A productive pot plant! There are potted plants to suit every back pocket, and some awesome selections include chillies, cherry tomatoes, citrus, olives or a mixed herb pot. Get creative... and get giving!

Gardening Gifts

If you're like me, come the beginning of December, I'm scratching my head to think of suitable presents that might be appreciated by the recipients. Even if I'm giving to someone who isn't really a gardener or not particularly interested in sustainability, it feels better to give something that I know is not just going to add further pollution to the world, but something that might improve it a bit. So here are some ideas – some are more suitable as gifts for avid sustainability devotees, but others could be given to anyone.

- **Recycled planter**

Although an obvious gift for a gardener is a plant of some sort, why not make it more special by supplying it in a container that is made from something recycled and is also decorative. It could be something simple and home made, as in the image on the right or it could be something more decorative and perhaps bought from a store.



- **Seeds**

Avid gardeners are always pleased to receive seeds, especially if they are heirloom varieties. This type of seed, obtainable from specialist seed suppliers, enables preservation of old genetic types that are being lost as large seed companies breed types that are quick to grow in order to please a mass market. Many of the newer seeds arise from cross-breeding of 2 different varieties to yield plants with particular characteristics e.g. colour or vigour. If seed from that type of plant is saved and subsequently sown, there may be no offspring at all, or, if there are, the offspring will not be like the parent plant. In contrast, plants grown from heirloom seeds will produce fertile seeds which can be saved and used to grow the same plant in subsequent years. So gifts of such seeds are gifts that "last" years.

You could even save seeds from your own heirloom plants, put them in attractive packets which you could also make yourself out of recycled paper – there are templates and instructions on various website.

- **Plant Labels**

Gardeners need to identify what seeds they have planted in either pots or in the ground. A great gift would be a set of these made from either plastic or wood. Perhaps accompanied by a weather-resistant marker pen.

- **Watering Can**

Watering cans can wear out, especially if they are left outside or used a lot. Some can rust or the screws attaching the handle can fall out. Plastic watering cans suffer from sun damage and have a limited life. Most gardeners find that having more than one is very useful. Look out for good quality examples or those that are decorative. Or you could paint designs on one yourself.

- **Insect hotel**

These creations, also called insectaries, provide somewhere that beneficial insects can shelter in the garden can serve as a garden decoration as well. You could make one like the example on the right, yourself – from a strip of heavy duty fabric e.g. shade cloth, with pieces of hollowed out wood packed inside. Bamboo is a useful material since it already has hollows, but it is easy to drill holes in other materials. Providing insect shelters like this are a great way of keeping control of the nuisance bugs.

There are also designs that provide shelter from harsh weather (wind and rain) for butterflies. They usually have long vertical slits instead of round holes.

Such "hotels" are also available commercially – just do a web search. But it is worth reading up a bit on good design and materials to use.



- **Nestbox**

Shelter for bigger critters could also make an excellent gift. They can offer places for birds, microbats, ringtail possums or sugar gliders. There are different designs for the different animals and birds. You'd best check out what creatures are in the area and, of course, if the recipient want those creatures in their garden.



- **Compost bin or worm farm**

Since compost bins or worm farms are excellent ways of turning waste into "black gold" for the garden, they make wonderful gifts. Of course, check first if your recipient has one already.

- **Tools or Clothing**

There many garden tools which gardeners need. Giving them as gifts mean you can buy higher quality than gardeners might for themselves:

- secateurs
- lopper for difficult pruning branches thicker than those that secateurs can cut
- a really lovely and long lasting stainless steel hand trowel or hand fork
- long lasting scratch-proof garden gloves
- pruning saw
- knee pads that strap on
- tool carrier – either a tool belt/apron to wear around the waist or a caddy to carry.



- **Other Ethical Gifts**

If your special person is not a gardener but you are, there are a number of other gift items that have reduced environmental or social impacts. There are now – at last! – dozens of ethical gift opportunities. These include:

- soaps and hand wash made from natural or organic materials
- fair trade products
- organic food products e.g. natural honey

- **Reusable Beeswax Food Wraps**

This is an idea that particularly attracted our attention. These food wraps are a colourful, durable, washable alternatives to plastic bags for packing snacks, sandwich lunches or fruit for the person on the go, and can also be used for storing food in the fridge or pantry. Available from several manufacturers, they are usually made from organic cotton and coated with beeswax blending with natural resins. There is even online advice on how to make your own.

Jerk chicken with rice & peas

Ingredients

12 chicken thighs, bone in
1 lime, halved
hot sauce, to serve (optional)

For the marinade

1 big bunch spring onions, roughly chopped
thumb-sized piece ginger, roughly chopped
3 garlic cloves
½ a small onion
3 scotch bonnet chillies, deseeded if you want less heat
½ tsp dried thyme, or 1 tbsp thyme leaves
1 lime, juiced
2 tbsp soy sauce
2 tbsp vegetable oil
3 tbsp brown sugar
1 tbsp ground allspice

For the rice & peas

200g basmati rice

400g can coconut milk
1 bunch spring onions, sliced
2 large thyme sprigs
2 garlic cloves, finely chopped
1 tsp ground allspice
2 x 410g cans kidney beans, drained



Method

To make the jerk marinade, combine the spring onions, ginger, garlic, onion, scotch bonnet chillies, dried thyme, lime juice, soy sauce, vegetable oil, brown sugar and ground allspice in a [food processor](#) along with 1 tsp salt, and blend to a purée. If you're having trouble getting it to blend, just keep turning off the blender, stirring the mixture, and trying again. Eventually it will start to blend up – don't be tempted to add water, as you want a thick paste.

Taste the jerk mixture for seasoning – it should taste pretty salty, but not unpleasantly, puckering salty. You can now throw in more chillies if it's not spicy enough for you. If it tastes too salty and sour, try adding in a bit more brown sugar until the mixture tastes well balanced.

Make a few slashes in 12 chicken thighs and pour the marinade over the meat, rubbing it into all the crevices. Cover and leave to marinate overnight in the fridge.

If you want to barbecue your chicken, get the coals burning 1 hr or so before you're ready to cook. Authentic jerked meats are not exactly grilled as we think of grilling, but sort of smoke-grilled. To get a more authentic jerk experience, add some wood chips to your barbecue, and cook your chicken over slow, indirect heat for 30 mins.

To cook in the oven, heat to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Put the chicken pieces in a roasting tin with the halved lime and cook for 45 mins until tender and cooked through.

While the chicken is cooking, prepare the rice & peas. Rinse the basmati rice in plenty of cold water, then tip it into a large saucepan. Add the coconut milk, spring onions, thyme sprigs, garlic and ground allspice.

Season with salt, add 300ml cold water and set over a high heat. Once the rice begins to boil, turn it down to a medium heat, cover and cook for 10 mins. Add the kidney beans to the rice, then cover with a lid. Leave off the heat for 5 mins until all the liquid is absorbed.

Squeeze the roasted lime over the chicken and serve with the rice & peas, and some hot sauce if you like it really spicy.



Important Fire Information 2020 / 2021

PROHIBITED BURNING TIMES

1 November 2020 to 7 February 2021

Prohibited Burning Times are declared by the Fire & Emergency Services (FES) Minister. During this period you must not start a fire in the open air. The penalty is up to \$10,000 or 12 months' imprisonment or both.

RESTRICTED BURNING TIMES

19 September 2020 to 31 October 2020
1 February 2021 to 22 March 2021

During the Restricted Burning Periods you must not start a fire without a permit. **Dates for prohibited and restricted burning times may change** depending on prevailing weather conditions. Any date changes will be published on the Shire of Kent website at www.kent.wa.gov.au/emergencies/bushfire

TOTAL FIRE BANS

A Total Fire Ban (TFB) prohibits the lighting of any fires in the open air and other activities that may start a fire. This includes all open air cooking or camping fires, incinerators, welding, grinding, soldering or gas cutting. The use of equipment powered by internal combustion engines in any area where there is bush, crops, pasture or stubble is also prohibited. Farmers can still harvest their crop and feed or water stock in a paddock, unless a Harvest & Vehicle Movement Ban has been declared by the Shire. A TFB is declared the evening before the day it is to take effect. Check the Emergency WA website (www.emergency.wa.gov.au) after 6pm to see if a ban has been declared for the next day or call the TFB hotline on **1800 709 355**. For more information visit the DFES website at www.dfes.wa.gov.au/totalfirebans/pages/whatisatfb.aspx.

AGRICULTURAL OPERATIONS

During Restricted or Prohibited Burning Times all harvesting machinery must carry a fire extinguisher. During harvesting operations, a fully operational fire fighting unit with a minimum water capacity of 600 litres, a fire fighting pump and hose is to be located in the paddock being harvested.

HARVEST & VEHICLE MOVEMENT BANS

The Shire may impose a Harvest & Vehicle Movement Ban (HVMB) for its district, or areas within its district, during the prohibited or restricted burning times that prohibits harvesting operations and driving vehicles through bush, crops or stubble.

Vehicles and equipment may be driven on gazetted roads and laneways (provided it has a trafficable surface, is at least 4 metres wide, cleared of all inflammable materials with overhanging vegetation pruned so it does not come into contact with the vehicle).

You can still carry out the following agricultural activities during a HVMB, if you are accompanied by a mobile firefighting unit (carrying a minimum of 600 litres of water):

- water carting for stock and domestic purposes;
- travel to, from and within piggeries and feed lots;
- all necessary carting of livestock

Please note that it is your responsibility to check if a HVMB is in place before undertaking any activity that may be subject to the Ban.

- SMS to subscribing mobile phones (please contact the Shire on 9829 1051 to subscribe to this service);
- broadcasting on ABC radio

Important Fire Information 2020 / 2021

PERMITS TO BURN

A Permit to Set Fire to the Bush (permit to burn), must be obtained if you intend to light a fire during the **restricted burning period**.

- When issued with a permit, you must comply with the conditions listed on that permit.
- All permits are automatically cancelled on days where the Fire Danger Rating is forecast to be very high, severe, extreme or catastrophic.
- The Shire may cancel any or all permits already issued if it considers that there is a danger that any fire lit could escape from the land (under s.46 of the Bush Fires Act 1954).
- If a fire has already been lit, the Shire may direct that the fire be extinguished if there is a danger of the fire escaping.
- To obtain a permit, contact the Fire Control Officer for your area (see next page).




